Bryonn Bain, Assistant Professor in the Department of African American Studies and World Arts and Cultures/ Dance, found the UCLA Prison Education Program in 2016 "to make postsecondary education accessible to women and young people who are currently incarcerated, and to bring UCLA faculty and students to learn alongside them, thereby challenging bias, discrimination, and injustice in a shared and collaborative learning experience." Danielle Dupuy, assistant director of the Ralph J. Bunche Center of African American Studies and co-founder of the UCLA Justice Work Group, co-leads the UCLA Prison Education Program. James Jacob, director of Barry J. Nidorf Juvenile Hall for the Los Angeles Detention Services Bureau, where program courses are being taught, said, "At least 95 percent of our clients are redeemable without a doubt. Professor Bain, Danielle Dupuy and Rosie Rios are absolutely brilliant people, with a burning desire to help those who do not have a voice in the prison system. Kimberlé Williams Crenshaw was recognized by the New York Women's Foundation for her contributions to social justice and equality and her positive influence on the lives of women and girls. Crenshaw is known for coining the term "intersectionality" to describe the exclusion of Black women from feminist theory and policy discourse directed against racism. She is also the founder and director of the

Center for Intersectionality and Social Policy Studies at Columbia Law School and the co-founder and executive director of the African American Policy Forum, a think tank that connects academics, activists and policy-makers to dismantle structural inequality.
