

Rock and Roll Hall of Fame inductee, John Densmore, offers scholarships to UCLA African American students

In 1991, John Densmore (former drummer for the musical group, *The Doors*) established an endowment fund to support UCLA undergraduate students who major or minor in African American Studies. This academic year, 2018-19, the scholarship was awarded to Harold Grigsby III, a senior pursuing a Bachelor's degree in African American Studies and Public Affairs, and a team member of the Million Dollar Hoods project.

Chandra Ford addresses how public health experts can reduce racial bias in their work

"Race is a social construct and not a biological attribute, but scientists continue to design studies that reinforce the notion that race and ethnicity are causes of health outcomes," said Chandra Ford, Associate Professor in the Department of Community Health Sciences and Director of the Center for the Study of Racism, Social Justice & Health. Ford was recently a guest editor of Ethnicity & Disease, where she and colleagues examined a "public health critical race praxis," to minimize the risk of inserting racial bias into research. She said, "This is not a formula, but a broad, standardized

approach that researchers can use to draw attention to how racism can influence the empirical work that they do."
